

It gives this event a personal touch as the story tells of the everyday men who stood up to, at that time, the strongest army in the world. It is perfect to share with ELL students who may not have the background knowledge to understand this period in history. The illustrations highly support, and enhance, the text. I highly recommend it for anyone who teaches history.
